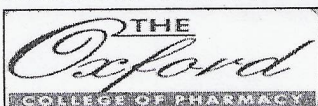

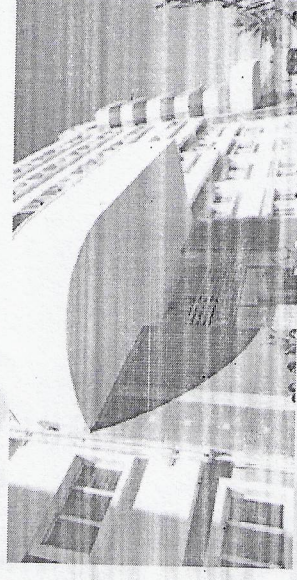

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PREAMBLE

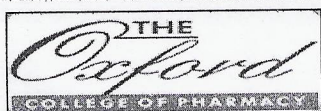
The Department of Pharmacy Practice organized the seminar on “Research Hypotheses” for the students. Dr. Padmaa M Paarakh, Professor, The Oxford College of Pharmacy, Bangalore delivered the lecture. There were 15 participants.

Hypotheses play an important role in research. They aid in design studies, allow for practical testing, and add to our scientific knowledge. Their main role is to organize research projects, making them purposeful, focused, and valuable to the scientific community.

The content delivered in the seminar is as follows:

The resource person initiated the session by addressing the importance of hypothesis plays a pivotal role in the scientific method by providing a basis for testing existing theories. It serves as a launching pad for investigation activities, which offers researchers a clear starting point. Hypotheses establishes clear relationships between phenomena, paving the way for empirical testing. A hypothesis aid researchers in selecting appropriate analysis techniques for their data.

Additionally, she explained characteristics of a good hypotheses. A good hypothesis uses clear, focused language to avoid confusion and ensure everyone understands it. The hypothesis should be correlated with the research topic, and act as as a bridge between the specific question and the broader study. An effective hypothesis can be tested, meaning its prediction can be checked with real data to support or challenge the proposed relationship. The hypothesis should clearly state both the independent and dependent variables, specifying the factors being studied and the expected outcomes. A good hypothesis avoids unnecessary complexity and is simple and concise, expressing the essence of the proposed relationship clearly.



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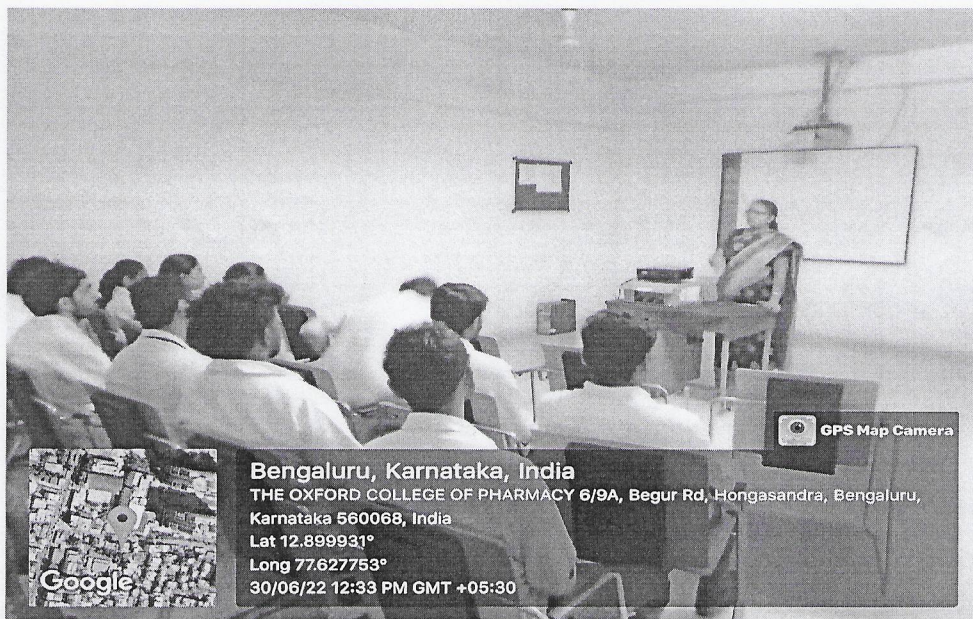
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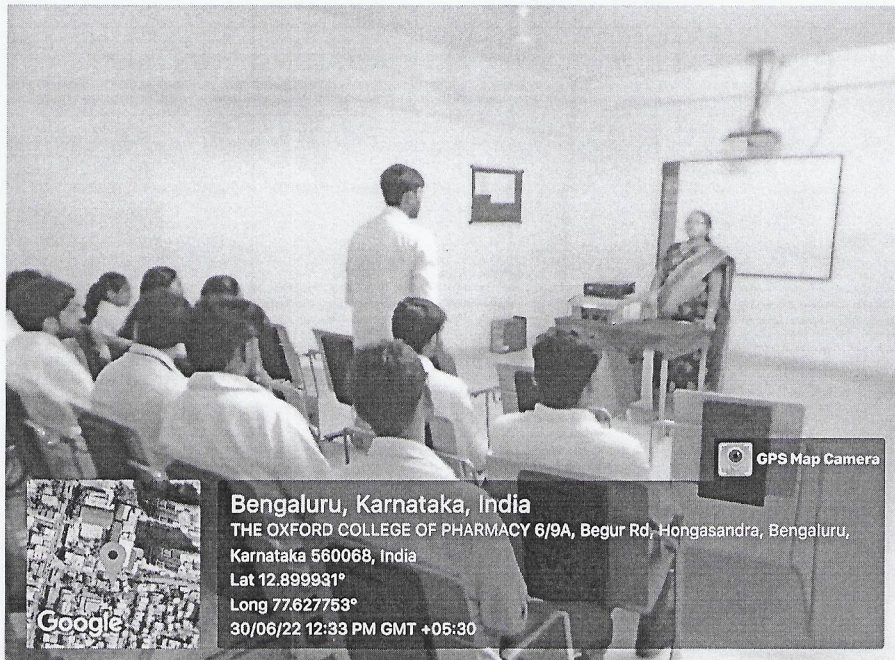

Dr. Padmaa M Paarakh interacting with the participants



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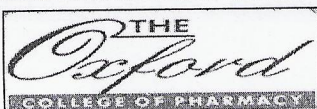
OUTCOME

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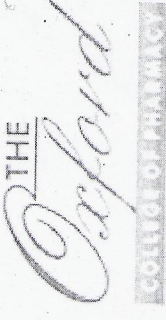

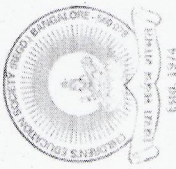

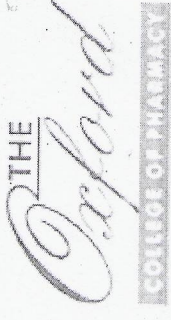
